Introduction

- 1. This epistle from Paul to the church in Philippi is one of joy and fellowship. In a way that is different that his other letters in the Bible, Paul shares a specific connection, friendship and specific concerns for the people.
 - a. What are some of your thoughts about Paul's letters? What do you expect to read/hear in them?
 - b. Often Paul's letters are very heady and have deep, intense theology. This epistle has great theology, but it is presented in a different way.
- 2. Philippi is a full on Roman city where the citizens are considered Romans.
 - a. This comes with a lot of opportunity for evangelism, but a lot of opportunity for oppression as well.
- 3. Paul helped start the church in Philippi on his second missionary Journey.
 - a. Read Acts 16:11-15.
 - b. Lydia and her heart of care, service and provision for Paul and his ministry was there at the beginning and would seem to be a staple of the church for years to come.

Themes

- 4. In the Book of Concord (the authoritative collection of the Lutheran Church's statements of faith) Paul's letter to the Philippians is used for some exciting and occasionally controversial topics:
 - a. Free will
 - b. Election
 - c. Good works
 - d. The Person of Christ
 - e. Righteousness
- 5. The explanation that is included in Luther's Small Catechism frequently references Philippians when talking about:
 - a. The 10 Commandments, Apostles' Creed, Lord's Prayer and Confession.

Salutation

Philippians 1:1-2 — What stands out in just these two verses (without looking down)?

- 6. "Paul and Timothy, servants of Christ Jesus, to all the saints in Christ Jesus..."
 - a. Here, as in 1 & 2 Thessalonians and Philemon, Paul does not assert his apostleship and authority.
 - b. The themes of servanthood and unity are going to be key all throughout.
